



The Unfinished Revolution: Black Reconstruction Today

Sunday, February 21 at 1:00pm <u>Online Forum and Discussion:</u>

Today's fight against entrenched racism cries out for a massive restructuring of society on the level of post-Civil War Recon-



struction, where former slaves led in creation of historic gains, including public school and health systems, Black political representation, and increased democratic rights.



Black Lives Matter at School

Wednesday, February 24, 6:00 - 11:00pm

"How can educators help destroy entrenched inequalities and enact the values of Black Lives Matter in their classrooms, schools, and communities?

Jesse Hagopian and Denisha Jones, both educators and members of the Black Lives Matter at School movement, join us via livestream to discuss this question. They believe that the United States is in the midst of an urgent moral and legal crisis over



the safety, liberty, and well-being of Black young people.

In an edited collection, Black Lives Matter at School: An Uprising for Educational Justice, they have gathered essential essays, interviews, poems, resolutions, and more from educators, students, and activists who have been building the Black Lives Matter Movement across the country. Hagopian and Jones lay bare the institutional racism inherent in our educational system, and present a critical call to radically re-

shape learning environments for all students.

Feb 25, 6:00pm - 7:30pm Free


Hosted by Northwest African American Museum, Washington State Historical Society and Washington State History Museum

Celebrated artist Jacob Lawrence, one of the first nationally recognized Black artists, taught at University of Washington and lived much of his life in Seattle. His works are held in prestigious museums across the U.S. and internationally. George Bush was the first Black pioneer to settle in what is now Washington, and his migration is the subject of a series of paintings by Lawrence.



They have a 24/7 unlimited platform that our students can access for support. They have Live Help which connects students with tutors via chat. They also have the capability to do annotated essay reviews with a 24 hour turnaround time.

Our teachers will have visibility to everything their students do on-line. This system will let teachers know of any common theme of questions that students ask from their class so they can plan accordingly.

Children's Film Festival Seattle 2021

For the 16th Annual Children's Film Festival Seattle (February 18-28, 2021), Northwest Film Forum goes completely virtual to honor the theme of "Love & Light," and to inspire empathy, understanding, and a nuanced view of the world.

This year's festival will feature four feature films and 16 short film programs representing 36 countries, with live-action and animated films delineated by age-appropriate viewing brackets. In total, there are 133 films in the festival this year.

Since 2005, CFFS has used film as a tool for championing racial equity, diversity, inclusivity, social justice, global awareness, and the best in visual storytelling for young people. Crafted with care and concern for the urgent issues of the moment, the festival stands out for its ability to showcase the best and brightest in international cinema, while always upholding its values and commitment to creating intimate, communityminded viewing experiences.

What does it mean to be a man?

How do I become a man?

You might have asked yourself these questions or maybe this is the first time. Becoming A Man[®] (BAM[®]) is open to everyone willing to meet the **CHALLENGE** of answering these questions. If you are curious or ready, BAM is calling you!

The BAM Curriculum Emphasizes Six Core Values:

INTEGRITY

Students learn that a man is someone who is reliable, honest, either in touch with his virtues or finds his inner virtues, makes amends when he loses his direction and does what he says he is going to do.

ACCOUNTABILITY

Students learn that they should be responsible for the choices they make and take ownership for their feelings, thoughts, and behaviors. A man can feel anger, sadness, or fear, but he must own his reactions to those emotions.

SELF-DETERMINATION

Students learn the importance of focus and perseverance in reaching one's goals. They learn to deal with self-defeating feelings, thought and behaviors that can become obstacles or barriers to achieving their goals.

RESPECT FOR WOMANHOOD

Students are challenged to take a critical look at the values and actions that represent positive experiences and appreciation for women. They learn appropriate and positive communication skills to begin using them for their interactions with women, thereby increasing respect for women of all ages.

POSITIVE ANGER EXPRESSION

Students learn anger awareness, coping skills, and effective techniques to express anger. In turn, students may avoid negative consequences such as suspensions, arrests, and damaged relationships.

VISIONARY GOAL-SETTING

Students learn to envision their futures and make clear connections between current behaviors, attitudes, values, and visions. They seek to identify any traumas or faulty thinking that may cause them to respond in negative and destructive ways. They then learn how to heal themselves and direct energy toward achieving their vision.
